FACULTY SENATE MINUTES SAM HOUSTON STATE UNIVERSITY November 6, 2008

Chair Stacey Edmonson called the meeting to order at 3:30 p.m.

Approval of Minutes:

Acceptance of the amended minutes from the October 6, 2008 meeting was moved and they were approved.

Chair's Report

- APC Meeting on November 5, 2008.
 - SACS review taking place with oral report next Thursday (13 Nov.)
 - The 2:00 December graduation period with 550 students scheduled exceeds estimated capacity. Thus the administration is looking for options. Senate should anticipate memorandum addressing this issue.
 - Syllabus guidelines: These address items to be in each syllabus provided to students and specific items were approved by APC. We should anticipate distribution from Deans.
 - The Policy on Reappointment Tenure Promotion: APC proposed modifications to policy. "Early consideration for tenure...requires approval of Chair and Dean prior to progress to DPTAC. Failure of the applicant to o provide completely truthful and accurate documentation is grounds for denial."

Senate discussion followed. The general consensus of senators is that any proof of dishonesty" would be better wording than "completely truthful and accurate".

An impromptu CAD meeting is introducing a restriction of self-nomination from Associate to Full Professor rank to include a three-year interval.

Senate discussion followed. Self-promotion is important and this restriction represents a significant change in our policy. General Senate consensus is that the Academic Affairs committee should address this issue; their charge is to review, evaluate and provide recommendation to Senate on Dec.6th. Following Senate approval the chair will request a proposed change in writing.

- The Faculty Development Leave Committee: Provost can grant a leave without the official process. This would be unusual and rare.
- Senator Executive Committee meeting with Provost Payne on October 21st
 - Property on FM 222 near the Woodlands is to be obtained from Lone Star College such that we will have our own University Center facility. This is a grant of land on which the university will be obligated to construct a facility. We will still be bound by University Center restrictions and agreements.
 - The \$3.4M allotment from Coordinating Board has been approved.
 - Randy Best Public/Private partnership proposal in Educational Leadership is ongoing for its doctoral program. There are also discussions for MS-CJ and MS-Digital Security degree programs that will be on-line offerings.
 - Fees and designated tuition for SHSU is going forward. Athletics currently receive 50% of the student services fee but in the proposed fee structure it will have its own fee which includes \$2 to support the golf course.
- Texas Council of Faculty Senate Meeting in Austin
 - System and Dr. Craycraft indicate tuition deregulation will be a topic of legislature session but do not anticipate change.
 - The future of Higher Education programs in US, especially in STEM fields, is of concern.
 - The Board is requesting full formula funding.
 - Funding on course completion is being seriously considered. Only SHSU and TxSt of all 35 universities would not experience reduction in funding.
 - Faculty salaries and salary compression will be examined.
 - The Business Meeting on Saturday was quite informative in that its focus was on the organization assisting in reforming or redirecting the legislators' perceptions of the roles and responsibilities of faculty.

Old Business: None

New Business:

- Senators Bill Lutterschmidt and Brian Loft explored/discussed Faculty Club
 - Would the administration support another trail? Discussions with administrators indicated, yes. John McCauskie invited Senators Lutterschmidt and Loft to propose to our architects to place in conjunction with a new dining facility. Alumni support also exists. They concluded that now is the time for a formal proposal. Our draft would first go to Dr. Eglasaer. The dining facility with pub will be an area for entertainment to be used by faculty as well as university development, alumni and President's Office. It needs to be of similar quality as that at Rice or Baylor. Senators Lutterschmidt and Loft are requesting a charge from Senate to proceed under the auspices of a Senate effort to promote "university-wide collegiality" and interdepartmental as well as faculty-staff interaction.

Senate discussion followed. A motion was made and passed directing work with administration to develop a Faculty Club proposal by Dec. 1st meeting of Senate.

- Calendar Committee Issues
 - It was announced that SHSU is out of compliance with the Coordinating Board's Common calendar and that Senate had brought this to the administration's attention. As a result, the Calendar Committee is schedule to meet again.

Senate discussion followed and several constructive suggestions were made. We must have a presentation with respect to spring starting dates because we are presently starting one week late and have an additional presentation to address the M-day/T-day mismatch. The Wednesday starting day is better in that it promotes community and faculty collegiality because it allows for most faculty to attend the President's address. Senate should promote inclusion of dead day(s) which enhance student performance. If we constructed the schedules to include multiple days or a week for study and mentoring they could start after the 45th instructional day.

Committee Reports:

- <u>Faculty Affairs</u>: no report
- <u>Committee on Committees</u>: The on-line survey is being prepared
- Academic Affairs:

A report on the extended calendar versus a shorter academic calendar and potential impact on academic integrity was presented. Research indicates there is no statistical difference between the extended calendar and shorter semesters. General discussion followed with various observations of past history and suggestions of component issues to address relating to the academic calendar. The Academic Affairs report is appended to the minutes.

• <u>University Affairs:</u> A bookstore survey is to be distributed in draft form to the Senate for use in the Spring.

Senate adjourned at 5:00

• Adjournment followed Chair Edmonson's announcement that following the December 1st meeting will be the President's reception. We shall meet in Austin College at the regular time prior to transit to the LSC. At the meeting we will hear presentations from Heather Crowson and Jackie Williams.

REPORT

Regarding: Academic Calendar

Charge

The Academic Affairs Committee was charged with evaluating how a shorter academic semester may impact student performance within an academic course. This charge is base upon the following:

1) Sam Houston State University typically enforces the "45-hour rule" where as surrounding colleges, both within and outside our university system, do not.

2) Our academic calendar often creates discrepancy between hours of instruction for M-day classes versus T-day classes. (See attached pages)

EXAMPLE:	San Marcos, Lamar, Texas A&M, and Texas					
	M-day Classes = 42	thus 42 hours of instruction				
	T-day Classes = 28	thus (28 x 1.5) or 42 hours or instruction				
	Sam Houston State University					
	M-day Classes = 44	thus 44 hours of instruction				
	T-day Classes = 31	thus (31 x 1.5) or 46.5 hours or instruction				

3) Additional contact hours may place the research faculty at Sam Houston State University at a disadvantage in regard to scholarship. Faculty members, with reduced contact hours within our university system, have increased opportunity for conference attendance, presentation, and research.

4) Student employment opportunities are directly affected by the extended semester.

5) Academic integrity of grading is influenced by limited time between the final class day, the final exam period, and the deadline for final grade submission.

As a shorter academic semester may influence a student's academic performance, the Academic Affairs Committee evaluated student performance by comparing mean grade distributions from a "short semester" (Fall 2005) and "long semester" (Fall 2006 and 2007). Faculty members were asked to volunteer class grade distributions for analyses. A simple analysis (see attached) indicated that there is no significant difference (P>0.05) between student performance associated with a "short" or "long" semester. The Academic Affairs Committee therefore concludes that student performance will not be significantly influenced by a shorter course semester.

Recommendation

The Academic Affairs Committee recommends that Faculty Senate explore other options surrounding the procedures for how the academic calendar is determined. If the faculty has limited voice, Faculty Senate may consider student involvement though the Student Government Association. If there is strong student interest in demonstrating how the current academic calendar places our students at a significant disadvantage (regarding employment, career opportunities, etc.) compared to other students in surrounding universities, the university may considered such student concerns in determining the academic calendar.
