Get a job! So you have decided to major in criminal justice, and after a semester or two, graduation seems as though it will never happen (especially when you have three term papers due on the same day!), so no need to spend much time thinking about launching a career. That can wait for a couple years or until graduation is on the horizon. Wrong! Even if you are undecided about the career field you want to pursue, there are several things you should be doing throughout your undergraduate years at SH beyond excelling in your criminal justice major.

There are several opportunities for developing the tools that will help you enter the criminal justice career field of your choice and then advance once you are in that career field. Your non-criminal justice elective coursework provides one of the best opportunities to develop the tools or skills that criminal justice employers are looking for when they make hiring decisions. One area, and probably the most important area, is coursework that enables you to develop both oral and written communication skills. These skills are essential for every criminal justice career, and elective coursework that helps you develop communication skills should be at the top of your list in choosing electives. Students who can demonstrate to a prospective criminal justice employer that they have worked hard to develop good oral and written communication skills have a real advantage in the criminal justice job marketplace.

In addition to coursework, completing a CJ internship will help you develop the tools and skills required by today's criminal justice employers. Start planning early in your undergraduate program-this will allow you to develop the best career preparation to plan for your interests and aspirations.

Graduating with Academic Distinction

Through the Academic Distinction program offered at SHSU, students are able to gain recognition upon graduation due to maintaining an exceptional GPA, excelling in their major field of study, and challenging themselves academically.



Who's Eligible?

Students interested in the academic distinction program must:

- Maintain an SHSU GPA of 3.25 or greater.
- Maintain major GPA of 3.5 or greater.

- Must enroll in six hours of credit in our Academic Distinction program.
- Be of junior standing and have written approval of the Assistant Dean of Undergraduate Studies and Director of the Honors Program.

Why Participate in This Program?

Students graduating with academic distinction are recognized by:

- Cords at commencement
- Academic distinction placed on diploma and transcript.
