COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The main objective of this course is to develop your skills implementing business-oriented systems for electronic commerce using Internet technologies. The Internet is a generic, flexible platform on which to base world-wide systems for electronic commerce. Topics to be covered will include Graphics, Extensible Hypertext Markup Language (XHTML), Cascading Style Sheets (CSS), JavaScript, Dynamic HTML, Web Servers, VBScript, Active Server Pages (ASP), PHP, and Dreamweaver. Prerequisites: MIS 291 and MIS 390.
