Course Description: Psychology 131 provides a basic overview of the field of psychology as a scientific and professional discipline. Students will acquire a global understanding of the major theories, contributors, historical developments, sub-disciplines, and current controversies in psychology. Students will be exposed to the scientific method and how human behavior and cognitive processes are investigated within the broad field of psychology.

Course Objectives:

By the end of the semester, the students will be able to do the following:

1. To become familiar with major contributors to psychology and their related theories.
2. To learn about the various sub-disciplines of psychology and related conceptual material.
3. To acquire an understanding of the scientific study of cognitive processes and behavior.
4. To understand and appreciate the diverse areas of study within the field of psychology.

Course Text (Required): Wood, Wood & Boyd (2008). *The World of Psychology* (6th ed). Allyn & Bacon.

Course Format: Classes will consists of lectures, group discussions, and various media presentations

Classroom Behavior: You are expected to arrive on time and behave appropriately in class. You will show respect to your peers, as well as your instructor, by turning off all cell phones and other technological devices that could potentially be disruptive to your peers prior to the commencement of class.

Grades

Examinations: During the course, four exams will be administered covering the set of chapters covered immediately preceding the exam. All materials discussed in lectures and group discussion, as well as information contained in the text will be covered by the exam. Exams will be multiple-choice format. Each exam is worth 100 points.

Final: The course will conclude with a comprehensive final exam in multiple-choice format. The final is worth 100 points. The final is optional and may be used to replace any *one* of the four examinations. If you are satisfied with your examination grades you may opt not to take the final exam.

Class Participation and Attendance: Come to class prepared with questions and/or comments about the material in the text. If you foresee an absence on an exam day, you are responsible for making prior arrangements for that test. Emergency absences during a test day must be reported within 48 hours. Without an acceptable, documented excuse, make-up examinations will *not* be administered.

Grading System: The final grade for the course will be based on your performance on the exams, the comprehensive final, a presentation, 9 index cards, and your participation in three research and/or role-play activities. Any extra participation beyond the required three will count as extra credit toward your final grade.

Presentation: You are required to give a presentation to the class on a topic that interests you. These presentations can be conducted alone or in a group. You and/or your group can decide what information to discuss as long as it relates to the topic you are assigned. More information TBA.

Index Cards: At various times during the semester I will ask that you to submit an index card in which you are to write in your own words what we discussed in class that day. You are only required to submit 9 index cards and I will give you 11 opportunities to submit an index card.

Research/Role-Play Participation: You are required to participate in *three* of the following opportunities as part of your grade.

1. *Research Participation:* Students will take part in up to three one-hour research studies, each worth 20 points. There will be ample opportunities to sign up for research projects throughout the semester.
2. *Role Play:* Students will take part in half-hour role-play sessions with graduate students, each worth 20 points. If you make an appointment with a graduate student, you must keep the appointment or allow him or her plenty of notice prior to cancellation.

It is up to the student to choose the combination of research and/or role play opportunities they choose to complete the required three. Students may choose to participate in more than the required three research studies and/or role play sessions for extra credit. It is suggested that you sign up for an account on www.shsu.sona-systems.com so that you may have access to current research and role-play opportunities. It is recommended that you do not wait until the end of the semester to complete this portion of the course.

Policies

Academic Dishonesty: All students are expected to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach. Student Absences of Religious Holidays: Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: “a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20....” A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
