TRADITION CONTINUES BY VISITING UNIVERSITY CAMP

The Honors College continued the tradition of hosting the inaugural annual Honors Welcome Retreat for new Honors students at the Bearkat Camp in Riverside for the second time. Over 100 faculty, student ambassadors, and new members of the Honors College spent the weekend at SHSU's University Camp to get better acquainted with one another and with the Honors College faculty and staff. The retreat includes various ice-breaker games as well as line-dancing, zip-lining, kayaking, and the camp's low ropes course. Information sessions held at the retreat are intended to help new students better understand Honors requirements as well as learn about the opportunities available to them as Honors student.

Honors Ambassadors serve as camp counselors and spend a lot of time planning out the activities for students. "We spent a lot of time ensuring that the planned activities were going to be fun for everyone. It was really important to us to host games that encouraged comradery among the students, especially because no one really knew one another initially," said Shealynn Vogan, President of the Honors College Ambassadors. "It is extremely satisfying to watch the transition new Honors students go through in the short two days we are at University Camp. We are given the opportunity to help them gain a sense of community and friendship, which is ultimately the main goal of the retreat." Honors student and Computing Science major Mark Reyes submitted a poem for the Fall 2015 *Enrique's Journey* Common Reader submission contest. Students were able to submit work in the following areas: essay, fine art, classroom design, and poetry research posters. Contest winners received a \$500 award and the opportunity to attend an awards luncheon where, Enrique's mother, Lourde, joined the students for further conversation about the book.

The common reader for the 2015-2016 academic year was *Enrique's Journey* by Sonia Nazario. The common reader is integrated into classrooms through lecture, discussion, and assignments. The contest is for first-time incoming freshman at Sam Houston State University who read and write about the common reader. Scholarships are awarded to winning submissions. The scholarship that Reyes was awarded was sponsored by the Professional and Academic Center for Excellence.

The common reader program will continue into the spring semester. The Student Success Initiative will host the Immigration and Natural Law seminar. Immigration attorney, Audrey Biggar will speak at the seminar. Enrique's Journey and current immigration issues will be at the center of the discussion.

FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: DR. BRITTANY HAYES



Dr. Brittany Hayes joined Sam Houston State University's faculty in fall 2014. She earned her Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice and Psychology from Rutgers University and earned her Master of Arts in Criminal Justice, Masters of Philosophy in Criminal Justice, and Doctor of Philosophy in Criminal Justice from John Jay College. She previously held teaching positions at John Jay College and Rutgers University. At SHSU Dr. Hayes teaches Criminology, Victimology, and Introduction to Methods of Research. In fall 2015 she taught an Honors section of Victimology. "Dr. Hayes is one of my favorite professors. She is passionate about her work and she engages the students so we really understand what we are trying to learn," said Kristyn Couvillion, one of her Honors students. Similar to most Honors courses, the class was a small group of students, each bringing their own unique perspective to the

class.

Dr. Hayes enjoyed teaching Honors students for that very reason. The students come from diverse backgrounds and were open to sharing their experiences with the class. Each student was attentive and dedicated to learning and understanding the concepts discussed. She found that many Honors students would often further their studies outside the classroom. Dr. Hayes, along with a few select Honors students, will conduct research this summer on intimate partner violence in the television series, Teen Mom.


Diamond Kats

Innagural Moot Court Team

This Fall semester Sam Houston State founded its first Moot Court Team with 6 students. Half of the students are members of the Elliott T. Bowers Honors College, including Kristyn Couvillion, Chelsea King, and Kaitlyn Tyra, The Moot Court process replicates oral arguements made during the appeals process and helps prepare students for law school and their careers. Moot Court offers students networking and scholarship opportunities. Moot Court is a long and exhausting process, but hard work pays off. In its innagural year, a team from Sam Houston State made the "Sweet Sixteen" round in the regional tournament held at Texas Tech University. Kristyn Couvillion and James Perry made arguments against teams from Texas Christian University and Texas A&M University. It is rare for a first-year team to advance into final rounds but Sam Houston did just that. "Moot Court provided a way to better my public speaking skills and knowledge of the court system. I am excited to take this year's experience and further it in the coming years," said sophomore Kristyn Couvillion.



Sam Houston Quidditch

Honors students at Sam Houston State participate in a wide variety of clubs, organizations, and sports. One of the newest extracurricular activities is quidditch. Quidditch is based on the sport from the popular Harry Potter series. Quidditch was created in 2005 and brought to Sam Houston State University in 2009. Honors student Travis Ward tells us about his experience playing quidditch. Study Abroad 2016: London and Paris

The unique study abroad experience of the Honors Journeys seminar continues! Last May students traveled to Zimbabwe; this May students will travel to London and Paris. This particular course, titled "The Essence of the City from the Medieval to the Modern--London and Paris," will provide an opportunity for SHSU Honors students to explore two of Europe's oldest and most vibrant cities by critically examining the cities' deep and varied histories through their individual cityscapes. Students will visit ancient, medieval, and modern sites, explore castles and other ruins, walk through museums, ride various forms of modern transportation, and partake of local cuisine. Students will be able to walk in the footsteps of famous figures, both historical and fictional: English and French monarchs, Sherlock Holmes

and John Watson, Ernest Hemingway, and F. Scott Fitzgerald. To visit famous landmarks such as The Tower of London and the Eiffel Tower which have excited the imagination in myriad ways, to see those places where history was made, to tour museums where masterpieces of art are housed reflect what higher education seeks: to heighten and broaden knowledge and to create more well-rounded individuals. A group of eighteen Honors students will accompany Drs. Bell, Bilsing, and Lewis on this study abroad trip that is sure to be an enlightening journey.

JAMP Prepares Students for Medical School

The Joint Admissions Medical Program offers financial support to students as well as a secured seat in one of the nine medical schools in Texas. It is almost too good to be true but JAMP is a special program created by the Texas Legislature to encourage highly qualified but economically disadvantaged students to pursue a medical education. All the students in the program at Sam Houston State University are honors students, Ashley Platero is also an Ambassador for the Honors College. Applying to and participating in the program is highly competitive and rigorous. In addition to the GPA and MCAT requirements, the program also places the students in internships in the summers of their sophomore and junior years which they are required to successfuly complete. "But, if you want it bad enough, you will make the sacrifice," said Ndukwe.

JAMP is becoming more of a presence on our campus with 4 students being selected for this program, there are only about 100 students participating statewide. The College of Health Sciences received a \$20,000 grant from JAMP for the second consecutive year to help promote a summer camp that is offered for high school students to learn about JAMP and the medical field. Platero, who helps with the JAMP summer camp said, "JAMP helps you financially, it gives you experiences with internships and then, ultimately, it helps you get into medical school. It something you won't find anywhere else."

WRITING WORKSHOP HELPS STUDENT EXPAND THESIS

Paige Odegard was selected as one of 30 students nationwide to join the prestigious Naylor writing studies workshop. She used this to expand her Honors Thesis which examines the way first year composition classes address writing and the way students express themselves through their class assignements. Odegard hopes to change the way Sam Houston State University incorportates writing into curriculum and ultimately change how students look at class writing. Odegard has shown interest in technical writing and research outside of academics, and she also works in SHSU's writing center on campus. The experiences have given her insight into how many students view their writing and work which played a part in the formation of her research. "If a student has difficulty transferring their thoughts into a discussion, we diagram their ideas and use a form of communication beyond the


typical essay structure," Odegard said.

After taking technical writing classes with Dr. Carroll Nardone, Associate Professor of English, Odegard's eyes were opened to how writing is not just about research; it is also about the design of how you write and communicate with your audience. "Over the years I have come to see Paige as a wonderfully engaged student," said Nardone. "What impresses me most is her ability to use theory to question very practical points at the intersection of traditional English studies and rhetoric, and I think that is something she should share with the academic community."



HONORS STUDENTS IN THE LAB

Honors students Sarah Bivens, Lauren Rudie, and Sarai Mesa are participating in a research lab with Honors' very own Associate Dean, Dr. Patrick Lewis. Their work is centered around the segmentation of the cranial anatomy of various species within the genus Zygaspis, round-headed lizards from many regions in Africa. They work with CT scans and software that allows them to reconstruct morphological features of the cranial bones, particularly the jaws of the species within the Zygaspis genus. Bivens, Rudie, and Mesa have all expressed how grateful they are for the opportunity to do research and to receive recognition for their accomplishements. While conducting this study, they found three wormian bones located in the frontoparietal suture of Zygaspis kafuensis. This is the first record of these rare cranial elements in lizards. The students are working with Dr. Lewis to publish a paper with their findings, a major accomplishment for undergraduate students. "Working in the lab has been a big part of each of our lives and we are very grateful to be given the opportunity to conduct such novel research and work in such a wonderful lab," said Rudie. Dr. Lewis is incredibly proud of his students' accomplishments. They have assisted him in writing an academic article submitted over half a dozen grant proposals, presented their research at conferences. Dr. Lewis thinks of Bivens, Rudie, and Mesa as leaders in the lab, often teaching and assisting graduate students even though they are still in their undergraduate careers.
