Articles in English

The words **a**, **an**, and **the** are called articles. In English, readers often expect to see one of those words before a noun (person, place, or thing).

Which Article to Use

Definite article: the

Writers use **the** when they are talking about a specific noun, called a *definite noun*.

 \checkmark the store

Here, the word **the** tells us that the writer is talking about a specific store.

The can be used with both singular and plural nouns.

√ the stores

Indefinite articles: a, an

Writers use **a** and **an** when they are talking about a noun that is *not* specific (an *indefinite noun*).

Use a for nouns that begin with a consonant.

√ a store

Here, the word **a** tells us that the writer could be talking about *any* store.

Use an for nouns or noun phrases that begin with a vowel or vowel sound.

√ an apple
√ an electronics store

A and an are only used for singular nouns, not plural.

X a stores **X** an apples

Instead of using a or an for plural indefinite nouns, a writer would use no article at all.

Here, the writer could be talking about any group of stores or apples.

The Importance of Articles

When a writer does not make a noun plural *or* give it an article, this creates a problem for the reader.

X Max had idea.

Does the writer mean that Max had one idea or more than one? It is impossible to know. Instead, the sentence should look like one of these:

√ Max had the idea.
√ Max had an idea.
√ Max had ideas.

Singular Nouns that Never Need Articles

Some proper nouns do not need articles at all.

√ Huntsville, TX
√ Sam Houston State University
√ President Bob

These nouns do not need articles because there is only one of them in the whole world.

Note: Writers say **The United States** instead of just **United States** because here, the word **The** is not just an article. It is part of the name of the country.
