

1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this academic policy statement is to provide guidelines that regulate subsequent master's degrees at Sam Houston State University.

2. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 1.01 A subsequent master's degree is defined as a degree sought at Sam Houston State University after the completion of a previous master's degree at SHSU or another institution of higher education.
- 1.02 A student may seek a subsequent master's degree provided that the field of study for the subsequent degree is to be different than the field of study for the previous master's degree(s).
- 1.03 Upon the written recommendation of the department/school chair(s) and dean, the following maximum number of hours may be applied to the subsequent master's degree:
 - a. A maximum of 6 semester credit hours may be applied to a master's degree program of 30-35 credit hours at Sam Houston State University.
 - b. A maximum of 9 semester credit hours may be applied to a master's degree program of 36-44 credit hours at Sam Houston State University.
 - c. A maximum of 12 semester credit hours may be applied to a master's degree program of 45-59 credit hours at Sam Houston State University.
 - d. A maximum of 15 semester credit hours may be applied to a master's degree program of 60 or more credit hours at Sam Houston State University.
